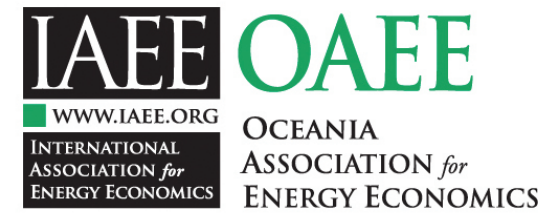

Energy market restructuring has been underway around the world for two decades. In the light of that experience, alternative market restructuring approaches can now be evaluated on performance to date, and measured against the challenges faced by policymakers and energy markets in the 21<sup>st</sup> century. Two of those challenges provide central themes for the 30<sup>th</sup> IAAE conference: the technological and policy quest for energy sustainability at national and global level, and the urgent development problem of securing reliable and affordable energy supply for the world's poor.

The 2007 conference of the International Association for Energy Economics (IAEE), to be hosted in Wellington by the Oceania Association for Energy Economics (OAAE), gives energy professionals the opportunity to discuss these and other energy issues in the summer sunshine of New Zealand's vibrant capital city. The venue is the Pipitea campus of Victoria University, located next to the New Zealand Parliament and Government centre, and close to the waterfront, cafes, galleries, theatres and shops of the city centre.

If you have not yet visited New Zealand, this is your chance to catch up with energy-sector developments in the South Pacific region and to meet policymakers and practitioners in the fast-evolving New Zealand and Australian markets, in the setting of a full international conference programme headed up by leading experts from the worldwide energy industry.
